3/5 gallon trees are \$45 1 gallon trees/shrubs are \$25 **EXCEPTION: Rusty Blackhaw 3/5 gallon is \$50 Some one gallon species are \$15. They are marked in the listing. EXCEPTION**

*Note that “gallon” refers to nursery trade pot sizes. The volume of a “one gallon” nursery pot is about 1/2 gallon. Similar ratios apply to “3 gallon” and “5 gallon” nursery pots.

You will see from the following list that this sale is mostly about woody species. These are the most difficult for us to transport and stock in our in-person sales because of their weight and size. Offering them through this online sale allows us to increase the number of each species available in most cases and expands the number of species we can offer.

If there is a particular Texas native plant you are seeking that is not on this list, please ask. If it is available, we will have it reserved for you at the in-person sale.

Recycle your pots & flats--Bring them to the sale. We will get them to the growers who need them.

All proceeds from this sale support our chapter projects, including native pollinator gardens, field trips, trail signs, student outreach in Williamson County, plant rescue and terrific monthly programs.

Page 2	TREES & SHRUBS, Large & Small, Protect trunks from deer antlers. Water and mulch to establish. 3/5 gal = \$45 1 gal = \$25 Some 3/5 gal \$50 (marked) & some 1 gal \$15 (marked)
1 gal	<i>Aesculus pavia</i> var <i>flavescens</i> YELLOW BUCKEYE Deciduous Shrub/Small Tree. 10-15' tall. Clusters of pale yellow tubular flowers attract hummingbirds Mar-Apr; Distinctive palmate leaves may drop by August. Part shade. Medium H ₂ O; Deer Resistance MEDIUM.
1 gal	<i>Bernardia myricifolia</i> MOUSE EARS Semi-evergreen shrub to 10' multi-trunked; Part Shade; Insignificant flowers spring & fall; Spurge family; Host for Lacey's Scrub-hairstreak butterfly. Important nectar source for native bees and other insects in Creosote Scrub habitats. Low H ₂ O Deer Resistance HIGH
1 gal	<i>Celtis ehrenbergiana</i> SPINY HACKBERRY Shrub to 10' Can be deciduous or evergreen. Leaf retention driven by moisture availability. Attractive light gray bark with spines. Inconspicuous white flowers followed by shiny red, orange & yellow fruits in the fall that persist on the plant. Valuable plant for birds and insect habitat. Good for erosion control on rocky soils. Low H ₂ O Deer Resistance HIGH
3/5gal	<i>Cercis canadensis</i> var. <i>mexicana</i> MEXICAN REDBUD Small tree or small shrub, Sun-PS, 5-12'H, Pink/Purple blooms March-April, Low – Very Low H ₂ O; Bees; Butterflies. Critical early nectar source. Larval host for Henry's Elfin butterfly, Smaller, more drought tolerant, with more curl to leaves than Texas Redbud. Deer resistance MODERATE
3/5gal	<i>Cercis canadensis</i> var. <i>texensis</i> TEXAS REDBUD Small tree or small shrub, Sun-PS, 10-20'H, Pink/Purple blooms March-April, Low – Med. H ₂ O; Bees; Butterflies. Critical early nectar source. Larval host for Henry's Elfin butterfly, Deer resistance MODERATE
3/5 gal	<i>Chilopsis linearis</i> 'Bubba' DESERT WILLOW 'BUBBA' Deciduous small tree/large shrub 15-40 ft., slender-twigged, often with leaning, twisting trunk and open, spreading crown. This variety has a strong vertical form and is less shrubby. It also has glossy, darker green, more lush foliage than other desert willows. Showy purple/pink/white flowers during growing season. Pollinators. Low H ₂ O, drought tolerant. Deer resistance MODERATE.
3/5 gal	<i>Diospyros texana</i> TEXAS PERSIMMON Semi-evergreen shrub or small tree with very hard wood, usually multitrunked. Normally 10-15 ft tall. Striking gray bark with age. Females bear edible black fruit 1" diameter. Birds, wildlife. Very drought tolerant, dry soils. Low H ₂ O Deer Resistance MODERATE
1 gal	<i>Ehretia anacua</i> ANAQUA 20-50' tree, larger and often evergreen in Zone 8b & 9. May be multi-trunked. Showy white flowers with bright orange edible fruit. Pollinators, birds. Low H ₂ O; but needs water to get established. Deer Resistance HIGH
1 gal \$15	<i>Eysenhardtia texana</i> TEXAS KIDNEYWOOD , Deciduous large shrub 3-12 ft. Bees flock to the flowers, which bloom at intervals through the warm months. Blooms heavily in spring & then after rain or irrigation. Foliage has a pungent, citrusy smell. Can be small tree with proper pruning. May temporarily lose leaves during a dry spell, but is drought-tolerant. Low H ₂ O Deer resistance MODERATE
1 gal	<i>Forestiera angustifolia</i> NARROW-LEAF ELBOWBUSH Evergreen/semi-evergreen shrub to 6' Silvery branches at right angles. Inconspicuous flowers serve very early pollinators in spring. Birds and small mammals browse twigs and fruit. Very Low H ₂ O Deer resistance MODERATE
1 gal	<i>Forestiera reticulata</i> NETLEAF ELBOWBUSH Evergreen/semi-evergreen shrub to 6' Silvery branches at right angles. Inconspicuous flowers serve very early pollinators in spring. Shiny, dark green leaves that are distinguished by prominent raised veins. Birds and small mammals browse twigs and fruit. Very Low H ₂ O Deer resistance MODERATE
1 gal	<i>Maclura pomifera</i> OSAGE ORANGE/BOIS D'ARC Medium-sized, 36-72' tree; short, often crooked trunk; broad, rounded or irregular crown of spreading branches; Armed: single, straight, stout thorns at base of some leaves; Durable tree, long history of use by settlers and Native Americans. Fruit conspicuous on female trees, green, the size and shape of an orange or grapefruit is inedible for humans. Medium H ₂ O Deer resistance HIGH

1 gal	<i>Mimosa dysocarpa</i> VELVET-POD MIMOSA Deciduous thorny shrub in Legume family. 2'-6' tall. Showy tubular-shaped clusters of dark pink flowers that fade to light pink at the end of stems are slightly scented, appearing Jun-Oct. Sensitive leaves close when touched. Extremely drought tolerant and must have well-drained soil. Songbirds like the seeds. Low H ₂ O Deer Resistance HIGH
1 gal (\$15)	<i>Mimosa texana</i> TEXAS MIMOSA Shrub 6', Small thorns are prolific, Fragrant fuzzy pink blooms Mar-Jul, Sun-PS, Low H ₂ O, Bees, Butterflies, Nectar source, Deer resistance. HIGH NOTE: We discovered this year what we have been selling as <i>Mimosa borealis</i> for years is actually <i>Mimosa texana</i> .
1 gal 3/5 gal	<i>Morus microphylla</i> LITTLELEAF MULBERRY Small tree to 25 ft. Edible fruit ripens in May. Smaller leaves and fruit than the larger Red Mulberry. More western species that tolerates drought, caliche and limestone soils. Attracts pollinators and birds. Low H ₂ O, Deer Resistance LOW.
1 gal	<i>Parkinsonia aculeata</i> RETAMA Small deciduous tree, usually to 15 ft, though may grow larger with favorable growing conditions, rarely beyond 30ft. Racemes of showy yellow flowers with a red "honey spot" that persists after the others have faded. Legume pods follow. Very tolerant of well drained soil types. Can become weedy in richer soils. Excellent nectar source. Very Low H ₂ O, Deer resistance MEDIUM. Livestock will browse pods
1 gal	<i>Prunus angustifolia</i> CHICKASAW/CREEK PLUM Twiggy, thicket-forming tree, 5-15' tall with fragrant white flowers Feb-Mar born in flat-topped clusters; edible sweet fruit ripening to red in Aug-Sep. Nectar for bees and early butterfly migration, birds love the fruit. Sun-PS, Low to Med H ₂ O, Sandy loose soil. Often found near creekbanks in Wilco. Good fall color. Thorns Deer resistance MODERATE
1 gal	<i>Prunus caroliniana</i> CHERRY LAUREL Evergreen dense shrub or tree 12 to 36 ft. Pyramidal to oval outline. Flowers very early spring. Very important early nectar source. Nearly carefree, dark green visual screen. Can be sheared. Moderate H ₂ O. Full sun/PS Deer resistance MODERATE
3/5 gal	<i>Prunus mexicana</i> MEXICAN PLUM Small deciduous tree. 15-30' H, Fragrant white blooms in early spring, Edible plums, Sun/PS, Low H ₂ O, Superior pollinator source. Deer resistance MODERATE. Leaves, stems, & seeds are mildly toxic to mammals.
3/5 gal	<i>Prunus serotina</i> var <i>eximia</i> ESCARPMENT BLACK CHERRY Medium to 50' deciduous tree with extremely high wildlife value. Drooping racemes of white flowers as leaves emerge attract bees and other pollinators Red, then black fruit highly prized by birds. ONLY the ripe fruit is edible to humans. All other parts are poisonous if ingested. This means Deer resistance is HIGH. Prefers calcareous soils of Central Texas Escarpment and some moisture. Medium H ₂ O
1 gal 3/5 gal	<i>Ptelea trifoliata</i> WAFER ASH 10-15 ft. tall shrub or small understory tree. Conspicuous flowers & seeds. Sun-PS, Low to High H ₂ O, prefers moist soil, found along streams in Wilco. Larval host for Giant Swallowtail butterfly, Birds. Deer resistance HIGH
1 gal	<i>Quercus laceyi</i> LACEY OAK Medium-sized 20-40' deciduous tree. Mar-May, New leaves peach-colored, turning blue-green, then back to peach in fall. Tree takes on smoky appearance in summer. Good for small yards. White oak type/oak wilt resistant. Dry rocky soil. Low H ₂ O Deer Resistance LOW
1 gal	<i>Quercus macrocarpa</i> BUR OAK Deciduous large 80-100' tree in white oak group, Mar-May, a fine shade tree, with golf ball-sized acorns. Large leaves, long-lived and fast-growing for an oak. Intolerant of root zone disturbance. Low H ₂ O Deer Resistance LOW
3/5 gal	<i>Quercus muehlenbergii</i> CHINKAPIN OAK Deciduous Medium-large tree 45 – 110', Very attractive tree, shiny dark green leaves, relatively fast growing, relatively free of diseases and pests. Attractive fall color. Does best in well-drained soil and adapts to many different soil types. Low H ₂ O Deer Resistance LOW

1 gal	<i>Rhus aromatica</i> FRAGRANT SUMAC Irregular, spreading, deciduous shrub, 6-12 ft. tall, with velvety twigs and lower branches turned up at the tips. Glossy, somewhat blue-green, coarsely toothed, trifoliate leaves turn orange, red, purple and yellow in the fall. Yellowish catkin-like flowers precede dark-red berries on female plants which persist into March. Red-banded hairstreak butterfly larval host. Low H ₂ O. Deer Resistance MEDIUM
1 gal	<i>Rhus microphylla</i> LITTLELEAF SUMAC . Deciduous spreading shrub 5-10' in each direction. Small compound leaves give a fine textured appearance. Whitish clusters of flowers appear before leaves. Clusters of fruit are reddish and eaten by turkeys, quail and songbirds. Deer, sheep, and goats will browse. Very Low H ₂ O. Tolerant of a variety of soils.
1 gal (\$15)	<i>Sabal minor</i> DWARF PALMETTO Fan-shaped evergreen palm 5-10' Usually stemless, the leaves arising from an underground stock can be as much as 4 feet wide on mature plant. White blooms produce black fruit about 1/2" wide in long clusters. Birds eat fruit. Tolerates heavy soils, poor drainage, deciduous shade. All H ₂ O, Bees, Deer resistance HIGH
1 gal	<i>Senegalia berlandieri</i> GUAJILLO Deciduous shrub 5'-10' with many stems. Creamy white balls of flowers Feb-Apr age to yellow. Very fragrant. Delicate fernlike leaves. The flower is a source of heavy, light-colored honey, rated by many as the best in the state. Larval host to Long-tailed skipper, Reicker's blue butterflies. Very Low H ₂ O Deer resistance UNKNOWN
1 gal	<i>Senegalia wrightii</i> WRIGHT'S ACACIA Deciduous shrub or tree, 10-30' tall. Showy cream clusters of flowers in early spring. Well armed with catclaw spines. Interesting seed pods. Attractive to pollinators and provides excellent cover for birds. Very Low H ₂ O Deer resistance HIGH
3/5 gal	<i>Sophora secundifolia</i> TEXAS MOUNTAIN LAUREL Evergreen multi-trunked shrub or small tree to 10-15 ft. typically. Sun/Part Shade, Very fragrant purple blooms in elongated clusters Feb-Mar, Seed pods, Low H ₂ O, Deer resistance HIGH
1 gal	<i>Ungnadia speciosa</i> MEXICAN BUCKEYE Small deciduous multi-trunk tree with rounded form, 12-30', can be pruned to single trunk. Sun - PS, Pink blooms Mar-Apr attract numerous pollinator species, Low H ₂ O Larval Host: Henrys Elfin butterfly, Nice fall color and interesting seed pods are mildly poisonous. Deer Resistance HIGH
3/5 gal \$50	<i>Viburnum rufidulum</i> RUSTY BLACKHAW Small deciduous tree/multi-trunked shrub to 15-20 ft. Can reach 30 ft. Flowers white, 1/4 to 3/8 inch wide, in rounded or flattened clusters up to 4 in. wide, Apr-May. Dark blue-black fruit loved by fall birds. Waxy leaves have excellent fall hues of red, lavender, pink, and orange. Good understory tree. Low H ₂ O, Deer resistance MODERATE
